

We are happy to announce that Carpenter's Mini Mall is donating \$100 a month to our scholarship fund. Supporting our local grocery store will also benefit students who apply for scholarships.

All profits from the drink and snack machines and the use of Safeway and King Soopers gift cards are used to fund scholarships for students who apply for them.

Purchasing and using Safeway and King Soopers reloadable gift cards is very easy. Individuals buying these cards need to reload them at the register for whatever amount they choose. Loading this card can be done by using your credit card, check, cash or debit card. The card is swiped just like a credit or debit card. These cards can be used to purchase fuel at Safeway or King Soopers as well as merchandise. You can still use your store card to get store discounts. Safeway and King Soopers donate 5% of all money that is used to load these gift cards to the Continuing Education program.

It is easy to purchase a reloadable gift card and use it at either of the two participating stores. Initial cost of each card is \$10 which is already added to the card for you to use. Checks need to be written to Idalia Vision Continuing Ed and can be purchased at the school office.

MARCH BOARD MEETING MINUTES

On March 27, the Board meeting was called to order at 7 p.m. Those in attendance included Board Members Ken Brenner, Amber Hardwick, Kyle Kite, Jessica Towns, Larry Weyerman, Superintendent Myles Johnson, Business Manager Autumn Helling, Assistant Principal Kristi Minor, and audience members Chuck Wright and Judy Wieser. Following the Pledge of Allegiance, the Agenda was approved. Next, the February 27, 2019 Minutes were approved. During the "Comments from the Audience" portion of the agenda, Chuck Wright and Judy Wieser updated the Board on current projects the Visions Foundation is pursuing.

The Business Service reports were then presented and approved. During Committee Reports, Jessica Towns provided the Board with a Health and Wellness update, namely the future installation of a hydration station in the JH/HS wing. Mrs. Minor gave an Accountability Committee update, which included discussion over the 2019-2020 calendar, parent survey, back-to-school night, and Artist in Residence. During her Principal's Report, Mrs. Minor updated the Board on student behavior and attendance records.

Next, Mr. Johnson gave his Superintendent's report, where an updated student count (204) was shared. Mr. Johnson then discussed technology plans for the 2019-2020 school year along with discussing the parent survey that will be sent out next month. Included in the Superintendent's report was informing the Board of recent submission of a grant application along with required submission of documents to the Colorado Department of Education and Civil Rights Data Collection. Mr. Johnson informed the Board that Summer Weights will be co-taught by Colby Newton and Daniel Weirich, and that we currently have no applicants for a Summer School teacher. Mr. Johnson then informed the Board that he accepted the resignation of Portia McPhail on March 25, 2019. The Superintendent's Report concluded with Mr. Johnson informing the Board that he and Mrs. Minor will be attending the job fair at University of Northern Colorado in early April where they will be recruiting for all current open positions.

Under "Policy-1st Reading" portion of the agenda, the Board approved policies IKA-E, GCBC-E-2, JICDE and JS. The Board also approved the repeal of policy GDG-R. Next, under "Policy-2nd Reading", the Board approved policies ADD, GBGAB, GCE/GCF, GCO, GDBA-E-1, GDBA-E-2, and GDCA. Next on the agenda was "Discussion/Action Items", where the Board approved the amended school calendar to reflect recent early release and school closures due to inclement weather. The Board then approved payment of a concessions trailer. During "Personnel Services" the Board approved all contracts for the 2019-2020 School Year as recommended by Mr. Johnson. The meeting was adjourned at 8:28 p.m. and the next meeting was scheduled for April 15, 2019 @ 7 p.m. Submitted by Myles Johnson, Superintendent


