

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## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

I hope everyone enjoyed a well-deserved Thanksgiving break with family and friends. The time between Thanksgiving and Christmas Break is always very busy here at the school as we complete first semester. Over the next few weeks, students will be completing semester-long projects and papers, along with preparing for final exams. Our elementary students will take their mid-year MAPS assessments to gauge their academic growth halfway through the year. Our December calendar is also full of JH and HS basketball games along with a host of other extracurricular events to keep our students busy and engaged. We look forward to finishing the semester out strong.

In mid-November, I was asked to be a panel member at the University of Colorado's Board of Regency meeting. The panel consisted of individuals from across the state, each representing a unique voice of rural Colorado and the specific issues we face. I enjoyed the experience, in which I saw firsthand how CU's Board functions. When I left that afternoon, I jotted down three central themes that were revisited multiple times throughout the meeting: 1. Teacher Shortage 2. Student Mental Health 3. Technology in Education.

From Idalia to Grand Junction, and Lamar to Durango, school districts across the state are facing a shortage of quality applicants. Although the rural areas of the state are especially feeling the stress of this reality, it became evident that even the more urban districts along the Front Range are not immune to this shortage. Although no cure-all solutions were realized or implemented during our conversation that day, it is comforting to know this is something on everyone's radar and state-wide discussions are taking place on how to best address the problem.

Along with the teacher shortage, much time was dedicated to student mental health concerns and resources. Nationwide, we have seen an increase in mental health concerns and anyone in education would tell you our first priority is the safety and well-being of our students. Although an incredibly complex issue that stretches far beyond the schoolhouse walls, our discussion that afternoon touched on what role those of us in education can play in providing supports and resources to our students.

The last point of emphasis was the role technology plays in education. CU's leadership predicted a vastly differently educational landscape in the not so distant future. One in which proven effective educators could not only be accessed face-to-face in a Boulder classroom, but rather through this new thing called the "internet" that even some of us out here in the cornfields have. Panelists representing the voice of rural Coloradoans wanted to make sure we have the infrastructure, broadband capabilities, etc. that allow us equal opportunities to access these future educational opportunities.

Overall, I found the experience to be educational and enjoyable. Not only did I find comfort in knowing we are not alone in tackling these complex issues, but also promising that meaningful conversations to address them are well underway. *Submitted by Myles Johnson, Superintendent*

## MORE BENEFITS FOR STUDENT SCHOLARSHIPS

We are happy to announce that Carpenter's Mini Mall is donating \$100 a month to our scholarship fund. Supporting our local grocery store will also benefit students who apply for scholarships.

All profits from the drink and snack machines and the use of Safeway and King Soopers gift cards are used to fund scholarships for students who apply for them.

Purchasing and using Safeway and King Soopers reloadable gift cards is very easy. Individuals buying these cards need to reload them at the register for whatever amount they choose. Loading this card can be done by using your credit card, check, cash or debit card. The card is swiped just like a credit or debit card. These cards can be used to purchase fuel at Safeway or King Soopers as well as merchandise. You can still use your store card to get store discounts. Safeway and King Soopers donate 5% of all money that is used to load these gift cards to the Continuing Education program.

It is easy to purchase a reloadable gift card and use it at either of the two participating stores. Initial cost of each card is \$10 which is already added to the card for you to use. Checks need to be written to Idalia Vision Continuing Ed and can be purchased at the school office.

- Be a graduating high school senior planning to attend a four-year accredited academic institution
- Be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident and a legal resident of Colorado, Georgia, Illinois or North Carolina.
- Have a cumulative, unweighted GPA of 3.5 or above
- Demonstrate financial need (annual household income no greater than \$70,000)
- Possess excellent leadership skills, an ability to persevere through difficult circumstances, and a strong interest in and commitment to their community

The Greenhouse Scholars application process consists of two rounds: To be considered for this program, you must submit your application by December 17.

#### Washington DC Youth Tour

The winner will join other students from Colorado co-ops and co-ops across the United States June 13-20, 2019. A week of activities begins in Denver on June 13. They will visit our state capitol building before heading to Washington, D.C. Once in Washington, D.C. the youth will meet many of our Colorado congressional members and learn about electric cooperatives and the issues facing the electric industry today. There will plenty of time for fun and touring. The lucky student will visit Mount Vernon, National Cathedral, Holocaust Museum, Arlington National Cemetery and Library of Congress. Stroll through the Smithsonian museums, visit the monuments and memorials and much more. There will be an opportunity to learn about electricity generation, transmission and distribution, while having the time of your life with over 1,500 other students. An evening at the theatre, a cruise on the Potomac River, dancing and mingling are all a part of this once in a lifetime experience with many memories to share.

# THE COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES' SUMMER MULTI-CULTURAL ENGINEERING TRAINING (SUMMET)

**Program Application is now open!**

## What's SUMMET?

The Summer Multicultural Engineering Training (SUMMET) is an engineering, science and technology program designed for **rising juniors and seniors** who are from underrepresented populations, including ethnic/racial minority, women and prospective first-generation college students. Students from Colorado and Oklahoma are eligible to apply to the program.

SUMMET combines course work, hands-on projects, industry tours, team building activities and social events. SUMMET provides exposure to the lifestyle, opportunities and challenges of college and is designed to help build skills and experiences for a smooth transition from high school to college. SUMMET is a two-week residential program, allowing participants to live on campus for the duration for the program, experience life as a college student, and participate in STEM related curriculum instruction.

The program is available at no cost to participants, with the exception of a \$50 confirmation fee for students accepted into the program. Transportation to and from the program is not included in the cost and is currently the responsibility of participants.

2. Student must meet a minimum unweighted GPA of 3.3, and upload their current, unofficial transcript to their application.


3. In the application, the student must answer each of the following prompts:

On November 19, the Board meeting was called to order at 3:30 p.m. Those in attendance included Board Members Ken Brenner, Amber Hardwick, Kyle Kite, Jessica Towns, Superintendent Myles Johnson, Business Manager Autumn Helling, Assistant Principal Kristi Minor, and audience member Chuck Wright. Board Member Larry Weyerman was absent.

Following the Pledge of Allegiance, the agenda was approved. Next, the October 17, 2018, Minutes were approved. The Business Service Reports were then presented and approved. During the "Committee Reports" portion of the meeting, Ken Brenner gave an update on the potential purchase of a food trailer to serve outdoor concessions. Jessica Towns gave a Health and Wellness Committee update, and stated the basketball tournament they hosted on November 18, 2018, along with the Community Thanksgiving on November 15, 2018, were both well attended and successful. Mrs. Minor then gave her Principal's Report, where she updated the Board on student behavior and attendance records, along with providing an update on the school's Christmas Program preparation, which is going very well under the direction of Betty Moellenberg and Judy Shively. 




## OPERATION GRATITUDE


