

September Board Meeting Minutes

On September 20th, the board meeting was called to order at 7:00pm. Those in attendance included Board Members Amber Hardwick, Jessica Towns, Dustin Weyerman, Ross Morris, Andy Richards, Superintendent Myles Johnson, Assistant Principal Kristi Minor, Business Manager Autumn Helling, and audience member Kyle Kite. Following the Pledge of Allegiance, the agenda was approved. Next, the August 16th minutes were approved. During "Comments from the Audience," Kyle Kite, on behalf of the Idalia Sanitation Board, briefed the board on the current state of the Idalia sanitation pond and asked the school to consider a financial contribution towards the upcoming project to ensure the viable future of the pond. The Business Service Reports were then presented and approved. Mrs. Minor then provided her Principal's Report, where she shared student attendance and discipline records to date. She also briefed the board and relevant information from the recent EC BOCES Principal's Cluster meeting she attended. Mr. Johnson then provided his Superintendent's Update, where an election update was given, stating that Dustin Weyerman has been elected by acclamation, with the other available seat being vacant until an appointment is made in November. Mr. Johnson then shared the school's District Performance Framework, in which Idalia was awarded the highest possible rating of Accredited with Distinction, ranking among the top 5 percent of school districts across the state. Under "Discussion/Action Items," the board approved the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Idalia Visions Foundation, LLC as it relates to the joint teacher housing project. The board then approved a financial contribution of \$15,000 to the Idalia Sanitation repair project. Next, the board approved a resolution to cancel the 2023 School Board Election, as one petition was returned for two vacant seats, resulting in no contested seats. The board then approved the 2022-23 Financial Audit as presented, which, once again, was very clean and reflective of the great work Business Manager Autumn Helling performs for the school district. The board then approved a resolution to add board members Amber Hardwick and Jessica Towns to the signature card with Wray State Bank for the Idalia School Food Service fund. Under "Personnel," the board approved Cindy Soehner as the Knowledge Bowl sponsor. The board then approved the updated Substitute Teacher list as presented. Under "Policy," the Board approved required updates to policies AC, GBAA, GBEB, JBB, JK, JKA, JKD/JKE, JKD/JKE-R as presented. The meeting was adjourned at 8:10pm and next meeting was set for October 18th at 7:00pm.

NEW DIGITAL FORMAT

In spring 2024, the SAT will transition to a digital format. Going digital means a shorter test– closer to two hours than three– and an easier testing experience for students on **Bluebook**TM, College Board's new digital testing app. Students will have more time per question, shorter reading passages, and access to a built-in graphing calculator that can be used on the entire math section.

To become familiar with the digital format, your teen will have access to full-length practice tests in Bluebook as well as access to free Official Digital SAT Prep on Khan Academy®.



Connect to Colleges and Scholarships: Through the new, free Connections™ feature*, accessible through the BigFuture School app, your teen can choose to hear directly from nonprofit colleges and scholarship programs that that are interested in students like them—without having to share any personal information.



Get Help to Pay for College: In some cases, a minimum SAT score and GPA are required to be eligible for certain scholarships. Without scores to submit for consideration, your teen could lose access to thousands of dollars in college funding.





School-Based Telehealth Counseling by Centennial Mental Health

The School-Based Telehealth Counseling Program partners with rural school districts throughout our region to expand access to behavioral health counseling services to students and their families. Our vision is to provide quality, comprehensive behavioral health care to the youth in our community while reducing the barriers experienced by families in rural areas due to work schedules, transportation and other factors that limit their ability to meet in our community-based offices.

PROGRAM GOALS

- Enhance student learning and emotional well-being.
- Improve access to care and additional behavioral health resources/services.
- Decrease stigma for youth and families engaging in behavioral health services.
- Collaboration with the school community to build support around each student's needs.



DOES YOUR STUDENT...

- Show signs of emotional distress, such as depression, anxiety or fearfulness?
- Have difficulty following the rules at home or at school?
- Need to learn better social skills to improve peer relationships?

- Master's level Therapists located onsite via tele-health at local schools help to reduce numerous barriers to accessing confidential, behavioral health support.
- Our therapists work closely with the student and the school staff on their treatment goals.
- Our therapists can conduct telehealth groups on-site with several students or provide targeted interventions to help participants develop positive relationships with other youth.
- Increased access for youth whose families have difficulty transporting them to appointments.
