

DECEMBER BOARD MEETING MINUTES

On December 11 the Board meeting was called to order at 7:02 a.m. Those in attendance included Board Members Ken Brenner, Amber Hardwick, Kyle Kite, Jessica Towns, Larry Weyerman, Superintendent Myles Johnson, Business Manager Autumn Helling, Assistant Principal Kristi Minor, and audience member Colby Newton. Mr. Newton informed the Board that attending a Board of Education meeting is a requirement for his Alternative Licensure program through EC BOCES.

Following the pledge of allegiance, the agenda was approved. Next, the November 19, 2018, minutes were approved. The Business Service Reports were then presented and approved. During "Committee Reports", Jessica Towns informed the Board that the Health and Wellness Committee was awarded an \$800 grant, in which the funds would be used to install an additional water bottle filling station in the school. Mrs. Minor informed the Board that the next Accountability Committee meeting is scheduled for December 17, 2018.

Amber Hardwick briefed the Board on the BOCES Board meeting she and Mr. Johnson attended on November 28, 2018. Mrs. Minor then gave her Principal's Report, where she updated the Board on student behavior and attendance records. Next, Mr. Johnson gave his Superintendent's Report, where an updated student count (207) was shared along with briefing the Board on different district accountability options.

Next, under "Discussion/Action Items", the Board approved the 2018 Mill Levy Certification. The 2018-2019 Final

Budget was then approved. Under "Personnel Services", the Board approved the amendment of two extra-duty contracts. The meeting was adjourned at 7:48 a.m. and the next meeting set for January 16, 2019 @ 7:00 p.m. *Submitted by Myles Johnson, Superintendent*

CALLIE RICHARDS—WOLF OF THE MONTH STUDENT PROFILE





In the December Wolfview, one of the problems from the UNC Math Competition was given. Here is the original problem AND the solution!

A prince's castle was sealed in terror, for the Red Death stalked his land ill-fated. In his ballroom, seven pairs of costumed lords and ladies were grandly feted. Seven different colors for seven pairs, their cos-



tume colors matched in pairs. For the grand finale, a mysterious guest presided masqueraded. Each lady chose a random lord for the final dance. These mixed-up pairs were then picked in random order by the masked warder. Your devilish task is to compute the chance that the second pair so chosen was the first whose costumes matched.

ANSWER: 5/42

SOLUTION: For the second pair to be the first costume match, the first pair must NOT match. Probability is 6/7 that the first pair does not match: Whatever lady is in the first pair chosen, 6 of the 7 lords will be a color mismatch. After that, there are 5 ladies and 5 lords remaining whose color matches also remain and one of each whose match has already been chosen. With probability 5/6 the lady chosen for the second pair could be matched. Only one of the 6 remaining lords will be that match. So the probability that the second pair is the first color matched pair is



 $(6/7) \ge (5/6) \ge (1/6) = 5/(7 \ge 6) = 5/42$




Santa Claus
