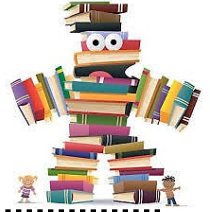

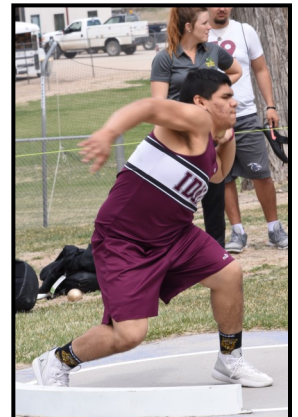
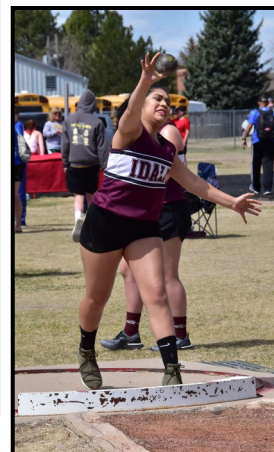
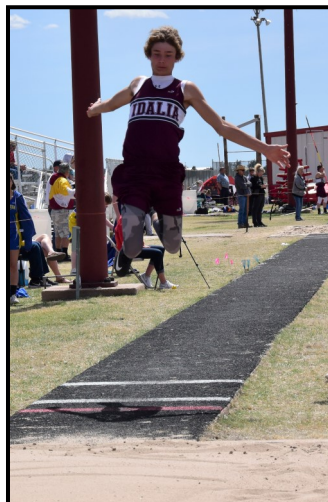
SUMMER WEIGHTS PROGRAM

On April 15, the Board meeting was called to order at 7:18 p.m. Those in attendance included board members Ken Brenner, Amber Hardwick, Kyle Kite, Jessica Towns, Larry Weyerman, Superintendent Myles Johnson, Business Manager Autumn Helling, and Assistant Principal Kristi Minor. Following the Pledge of Allegiance, the agenda was approved.

Next, the March 27, 2019 minutes were approved. The Business Service Reports were then presented and approved. During Committee Reports, Amber Hardwick informed the Board that Mr. Johnson and she would be attending the BOCES Board meeting on April 17, 2019. During her Principal's Report, Mrs. Minor updated the Board on state assessments, student behavior, and attendance records. Next, Mr. Johnson gave his Superintendent's Report, where an updated student count (204) was shared. Mr. Johnson then updated the Board on summer school plans.

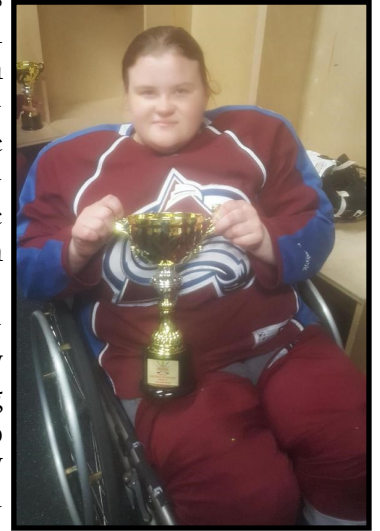

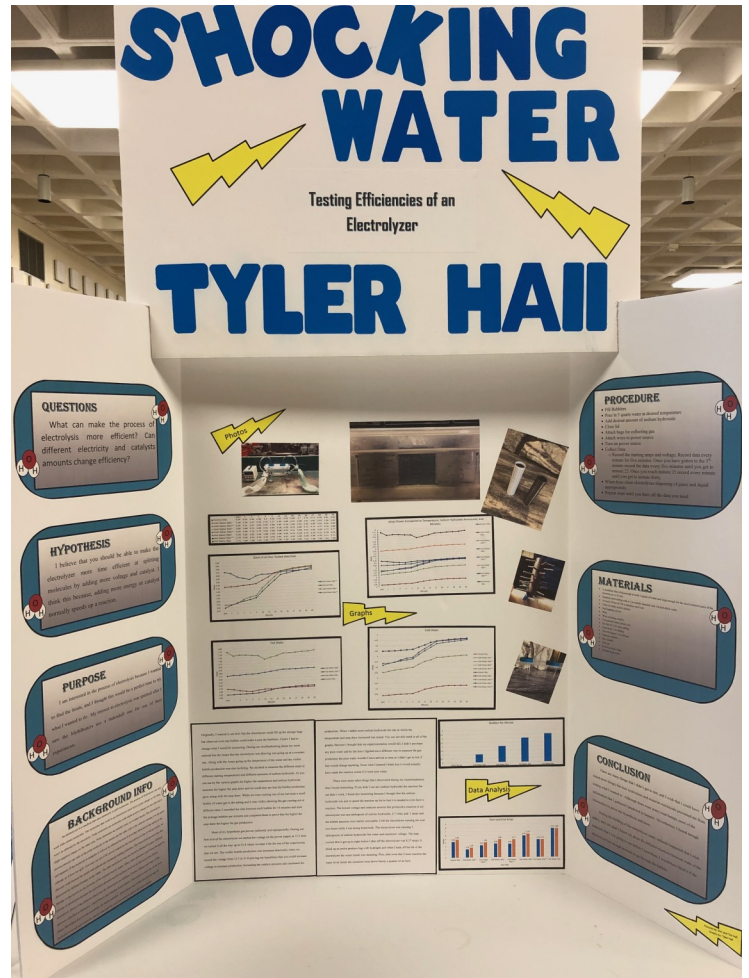


COLORADO HEART HEALTHY SOLU- TIONS
