

Purchasing and using Safeway reloadable gift cards is very easy. Individuals buying these cards need to reload them at the register for whatever amount they choose. Loading this card can be done by using your credit card, check, cash or debit card. The card is swiped just like a credit or debit card. These cards can be used to purchase fuel at any Safeway gas station as well as buying groceries. It is easy to purchase and use a reloadable Safeway gift card. ARE YOUR KIDS READY FOR ADULTHOOD?

EIGHT LIFE SKILLS TO TEACH THEM BEFORE THEY LEAVE

“*The days are long, but the years are short*” is a saying we think more about as our kids inch closer to becoming adults. We may start to panic a little when 18 is only a year or two away and wonder if we have truly prepared them for the day when they leave the nest and go out into the world. Beyond what we expect them to learn (by osmosis, at times), we can help increase their chance of being successful right out of the chute by focusing on some specific life skills. Here is a short list of some of the most important skills you can instill in your kids to build self-sufficiency:

Life Skill #1: HOW TO DO LAUNDRY—Yes, they may bring their laundry home while at college, but at some point, they won’t want to haul their dirty clothes home. This skill can be employed early for YOUR benefit—so start them out by sorting clothes. Teach them to run the washer & dryer, explaining the different cycles, and give them an overview of laundry products, from detergent to stain remover. TIP: Don’t forget to mention the dangers of bleach to colored clothes! This is a great time to stress the importance of completing a job from start to finish (washing to putting away).

Life Skill #2: HOW TO SHOP FOR GROCERIES—Eating well (and affordably) is important to both your health and budget. Choosing good food to eat and how to prepare it involves skills like responsible decision-making and self-awareness. Start your teens off by asking them to help you make a meal plan, to create a shopping list, and to take them shopping with you. Show them how to read labels, shop for discounts, and to choose fresh produce. They may learn to enjoy finding deals and saving money, but no matter what they will discover how expensive poor food choices can be.

Life Skill #3: HOW TO COOK—For some kids, the step from eating at home to cooking on their own is a big one. Make this transition easier by putting them to work in the kitchen before they leave. Start with simple meals, showing them how to use a variety of kitchen appliances (there is more to life than heating up leftovers in the microwave!). Show them how to use a recipe, kitchen tools, and a combination of prepared and scratch foods to slowly improve their abilities. Let them make meals from start to finish once a week to build confidence. Once they are on their own, you can ask to be invited over to dinner so they can show off their cooking skills!

Life Skill #4: HOW TO MANAGE MONEY—The more you discuss finances around your teenager, the more aware of money management they will become. Start by having them budget for items they want—using their allowance or money earned from part-time jobs. Help them see how many hours of work is necessary to buy what they want and encourage them to save for big ticket purchases. Some of the biggest challenges in adult life revolve around money, so learning money management skills can go a long way to reducing stress. Set them up with a checking account and make them keep track of it, balancing it monthly. Make sure they are active participants in financial aid planning—by seeing firsthand how much their education costs, they get a better understanding of how to make their money stretch.

Life Skill #5: HOW TO FIND A JOB—Finding a job is difficult for an experienced adult, so the task may feel insurmountable to a young teenager. Start with your teen by helping them to create a resume, including community service and home skills in the absence of paid employment experience. Build upon their strengths and not their inexperience—and remember that any jobs outside the home help them develop additional employable skills, self-confidence, and improve their time management ability. Help them to understand the importance of arriving to work on time, following rules, and giving 100% while they are working for someone else. And don’t forget to stress the security that comes with staying with a job, even when it gets hard!

Life Skill #6: HOW TO COPE WITH FAILURE—Living in an agricultural community, many of us have learned “*It is not IF, it is WHEN*” something disastrous will happen. As parents, we want to protect our kids from failure, but need to remember for both of us, that failure leads to success. One of the best ways to build perseverance is by getting back up after failure, time and time again. Praise your teen’s effort instead of achievement. Have their back while they are at home, allowing them the security of failing in a safe space, and be a model for how to bounce back after failure. The more they learn about failure, the more flexible and confident they will become once they are on their own and you can’t “save” them from their decisions or experiences.

Life Skill #7: HOW TO STAND UP FOR YOURSELF—Living in a close-knit community, teens in small towns are usually surrounded by supporters. However, once they step into college, technical school, or a job in a larger city, they may feel overwhelmed when they encounter people who don’t automatically have their best interest at heart. Show them that you don’t have to be aggressive to be assertive. Set up some scenarios to show them examples where they need to advocate for themselves (or someone else). By teaching them to be assertive, they are gaining skills which they can use in almost every situation. They will be better at making friends, express their needs, and increase success in business.

Life Skill #8: HOW TO TALK ON THE PHONE—For most adults, talking on the phone is second nature. But for today’s youth, their communication focuses mainly on their phones and other electronic devices. Because of this, they are often lacking in verbal communication skills and a clear understanding of body language and facial expressions. Ease them into this novel method by having them make reservations or an appointment by telephone. Stay close by but don’t interfere unless they need help. Talking on the phone expands their communication abilities and helps them recognize situations in which a phone call is the best way to get information across!

There are so many other life skills that you probably want to teach your kids, but this short list can help you focus on some crucial abilities your teens haven’t mastered yet. Take advantage of these last few years before your kiddo moves out to increase these important life-long skills, increasing their self-confidence and giving you peace of mind that your teen is ready to take on the world! 
